Readings: Matthew chapter 16: verses 13-20

<u>Reflection</u>: Is Jesus just wondering what people are saying about him? In part, perhaps; but the fact that he brings the subject up here, in Caesarea Philippi, suggests that there is more to it than that.

The city was named after Caesar - the Roman emperor. In fact it was not just named after him, but directly and deliberately in honour of the emperor, Augustus Caesar. This was the local seat of Roman power, and Caesar was very much 'Lord' here. This is the background to Jesus' questions: who are people saying that I am? and who do you say that I am? You may remember that a little earlier, when Jesus had come to the disciples in a boat in a storm, walking on the water, they had worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God'. Now Peter says something similar - not in the middle of a lake, where nobody could possibly hear, but close to a major Roman centre, where the emperor was, quite literally, worshipped. Jesus' questions are indeed about how people see and understand him... they are also about loyalty and belonging. Who is to be worshipped? Jesus is building on the foundations of John the Baptist, of Elijah and the prophets who came before him, to draw people back to God - away from worship of Caesar and all other competing loyalties. Jesus has a different kingdom, with very different values and priorities - the rule of God, who is love. So who do we say Jesus is? And where do our loyalties and our worship lie - not just on Sundays but in our everyday lives and decisions?
