## followed by The Lord's Prayer

Readings: Matthew chapter 16: verses 21-28

Reflection: Peter has just recognised Jesus as the Messiah. He, along with everyone else, is certain that he knows who the Messiah is, and how he will drive out the Romans by spectacular force. That is not an easy or comfortable sort of leader to follow, but Peter has steeled himself for the (presumably violent) struggle to come. Then, almost with his next breath, Jesus turns all Peter's expectations upside down. Gone are both the violence and the triumphal glory. Instead Jesus is talking about 'taking up his cross'; something which we tend to talk about metaphorically, but was all too real a prospect to Peter and the other disciples: something both fearful and shameful. Poor Peter - the change to his imagined picture of the future is too much to take in straight away.

Over the past few months it feels as though our own picture of the future has not just changed, but almost disappeared into a fog... We used to have a level of certainty that left us feeling at least partly in control - but no longer. Now nothing seems certain, and everything keeps changing. John Habgood, when Archbishop of York, said "Has it ever occurred to you that the lust for certainty is a sin?" But we yearn for predictability and certainty because it's what we have been used to.

We, like Peter, are on a very steep learning curve. Christ calls us to follow - not necessarily to see or to understand the road ahead, but to take our cue from him, as disciples stepping into the

unknown. May God give us courage to stop looking for certainty, and start listening for Christ's voice, calling us onwards... Amen.
