Reading: 2 Kings ch. 4: verses 42-44 and John ch. 6 verses 1-21

<u>Reflection</u>: Have you ever been to a pantomime of Dick Whittington? Traditionally he carries his possessions wrapped up in a bundle and tied to the end of a stick which goes over his shoulder. In my imagination, the boy in this story looks a bit like that, with his lunch of his mum's homemade bread and some dried fish, tied up in a bit of clean cloth. How come he didn't eat it earlier? Perhaps he was too busy listening to Jesus, or too busy playing around with the other children? Anyway, he realises clearly enough what the problem is, as soon as Jesus and the disciples mention it, and he offers what he has.

Did Andrew feel embarrassed bringing this tiny contribution to Jesus - did the other disciples laugh at him, even? But then, all eyes were on Jesus; and Jesus took the offer absolutely seriously - just as the boy had surely intended. The idea that such a tiny meal could go so far was ridiculous... and yet, in Jesus' hands it did. Everyone was fed. They all got what they needed, and more than enough.

We each have gifts, talents, and experiences. Each of us is unique. If we bring what we have, and what we are, to God, and then share what God makes of it, life will be infinitely richer. Because in the bringing and the sharing, all will be blessed. Amen.
