Reading: Mark 10: 17-31

<u>Reflection</u>: Jesus was a great storyteller: over and over again we read of him holding crowds spellbound as he taught them by entertaining them with stories, parables and jokes. The story of the huge, unwieldy, camel struggling to fit through the eye of a tiny sewing needle was clearly a joke - an exaggeration to make everyone laugh. But for once it didn't have the expected effect. Instead of laughing the disciples 'were astounded'. I imagine them shifting around awkwardly and frowning. They weren't rich, like the young man, but like him they thought that eternal life could be achieved by ticking off achievements on a list of 'good behaviour'. And perhaps they felt that behaving well and keeping the commandments - not stealing or cheating, for instance - would surely be considerably easier if you were comfortably off...?!

The young man was attached to things - to money and comfort and possessions - and to the idea that behaving well and keeping the laws was enough. Things and rules got between him and Jesus - between him and eternal life. He was never going to be fully committed to following Jesus as long as his wealth had such a high priority in his thoughts. Would we have done any better? Sorting out priorities and commitments can be tricky.

Eternal life can't be bought with money or by ticking off a list of tasks. Loving God is the most important thing we can do, and so we must learn to put it first.
