Reading: Luke chapter 3: verses 7-18

<u>Reflection</u>: Why did the crowds follow John into the wilderness? To be told that they were a brood of vipers? Surely not. But I find John's personalised answers to members of the crowd impressive. Rather like a newspaper or magazine advice column answering a question from a particular reader, and yet doing it publicly, in such a way that all the readership (or all the crowd, in John's case) can benefit.

John gave specific advice to tax collectors for living ethically in their context; and advice to soldiers which really applied only to their professional circumstances. He explained what the relatively rich should do, despite the fact that many listening to him surely had only one coat and no spare food. Yet from these very specific instructions, which weren't applicable to most of his listeners, the people were able to understand the wider picture, and how it affected them. They weren't confused when other people asked, 'What should we do?', but gradually realised that there were principles behind his answers: to be right with God, everyone had to share and to be mindful of each other's needs.

"So... he proclaimed the good news to the people" we are told.

What then should we do? How can we be a sign of the good news in our everyday lives? Surely the principle of caring for each other's needs is what God looks for from us, too... this Christmas and always.

Hymn: Make way, make way for Christ the King (R&S 141)

<u>Prayer:</u> Compassionate God, the world is full of needy people:

we pray, as we sing, for broken hearts to be healed,

and for those who mourn to be comforted. As we await, once again, the coming of Christ,
